









Organizational Chart

On behalf of the men and women of the Guilderland Police Department, it is my pleasure to present the 2024 Guilderland Police Department Annual Report. The report utilizes statistics, charts, graphs and documentation to summarize the outstanding work done by our members, sworn and unsworn, as we continue to provide excellent police services to the Town of Guilderland.

This year was filled with many accomplishments that make me proud of the dedication and hard work done by our members. We were reaccredited by the NYS Law Enforcement Accreditation

Program which consists of a vigorous review of 112 standards. We were first accredited in 2009 and only about one-third of departments in NYS receive this distinguished status. We upgraded our taser technology enhancing our ability to safely and effectively de-escalate volatile situations with less lethal force. We added four new officers and two dispatchers to fill vacancies created by retirements. We also created a new full-time position on the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) task force. We upgraded our phone system to a more sophisticated Intrado System allowing the capability to integrate text-to-911 and video-to-911 services.

If you are interested in working for a progressive, professional, well-trained agency in a thriving suburban community, look no further. The Guilderland Police Department aims to fill our ranks with the best officer candidates. We are currently accepting applications for lateral transfers in an effort to attract highly qualified officers with previous experience and from the current Albany County Police Officer civil service list. Accreditation

The Guilderland Police
Department was reaccredited in

2024, proudly maintaining its accredited status. Three New York State Division of Criminal Justice Accreditation Assessors visited the police department for three days in June 2024, assessing all 111 accreditation standards. On September 12, 2024 the New York State Law Enforcement Accreditation Council voted in favor of the agency being reaccredited.

Since 2009 the Guilderland Police Department has been an accredited agency through the New York State Law Enforcement Accreditation Program. Being an accredited agency is something that the department is proud of as only approximately one third of agencies across the state are accredited. The agency works tirelessly to comply with the State's 112 standards to ensure that the agency is partaking in best contemporary practices and operating on sound policy in order to best serve the public. The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services describes the accreditation program as:

Voluntary and designed to improve an agency's effectiveness, efficiency and professionalism; promote training and foster public confidence in law enforcement. Agencies must meet a set of standards in three categories: Administration, Training and Operations. Accreditation provides formal recognition that an agency meets or exceeds expectations of quality; demonstrates that the agency performs in a professional manner, has formalized policies in place to govern its operation practices and procedures, and that its employees contribute to the agency's mission and know what is expected of them.

The reaccreditation process occurs every five years and the agency is due to be reaccredited in 2029. The agency utilizes sworn personnel to maintain the accreditation program. Lieutenant Egnor is the Program Manager and Officer McCormick is the Assistant Program Manager.

The following accreditation standard was added in December 2024, increasing the total number of standards to 112:

1.3 – Accreditation Program Manager Training:
This standard requires that all agency personnel assigned to the duties of the Accreditation
Program Manager complete the DCJS Law
Enforcement Accreditation Program Training
within one year of being assigned such duties.

Training

A significant highlight of our 2024 training was the introduction of the TASER 7, which replaced our TASER X26 and X26P models. The TASER 7's updated technology enhances our ability to safely and effectively de-escalate volatile situations with less lethal force.



To ensure proficiency with the TASER 7, we implemented scenario-based training that focused on

TASER manipulation, effective communication, and decision-making in high-stress situations. Safe, effective, and properly applied use of force remains a primary focus of our annual mandatory inservice training. Our officers engage in realistic scenarios designed to better prepare them for real-world encounters and safer decision-making.

In addition to use-of-force training, we emphasize effective communication, particularly in high-stress situations, as it is our most important tool. Our officers participated in various classes and webinars to stay current on laws and case law regarding community interactions, ensuring the protection of our citizens' rights. Additionally, three officers completed crash reconstruction training to enhance our ability to investigate serious vehicle crashes.







Communications

The Guilderland Police Communications Division is the E-911 Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) for the Town of Guilderland, making Guilderland 1 of 5 PSAP's in Albany County. The Communications Division answers all cellular, VOIP and landline 911 calls made in the town and dispatches for the Guilderland and Altamont Police, Guilderland EMS and the 8 volunteer fire departments protecting the town residents. The Communications Division also handles walk-in complaints and answers all non-emergency phone calls to the police department. The Communications Division also acts as the afterhours contact for other town departments, such as the highway and water departments.



Our Communications staff continue to use RapidSOS and strongly encourage residents to create their free Emergency Health Profile at www.emergencyprofile.org. This provides first responders with critical medical information in an emergency to get you the right care at the right time. RapidSOS also allows dispatchers to communicate via text with callers and allows callers to share media and livestream with the dispatcher.

The Communications Division is currently staffed with 2 supervisors and 10 dispatchers. Each dispatcher completes approximately 6 months of training, which includes a 40-hour basic dispatcher course, 24 hours of Emergency Medical Dispatch, and CPR/AED training.

This year Guilderland Communications transitioned from the Central Square 911 phone system to a new and more sophisticated Intrado system allowing the capability to integrate text-to-911 and video-to-911 services.

In 2024, the Communications Division handled a total of 11,333 911 calls. This included 8,535 wireless 911 calls and 2,798 Landline/VOIP 911 calls. Additionally, the division received 31,975 administrative phone calls.

Furthermore, the Communications Division dispatched 6,939 EMS calls, 1,233 Fire calls, and 26,837 police calls which includes officer-initiated activity.

Our police department welcomed four new officers through lateral transfers from local law enforcement agencies:

- * Officer Nicholas Crodelle from the University Police Department at Albany
- * Officer Matthew Iuorno from the Albany County Sheriff's Office
- * Officer Steven Clermont from the Troy Police Department
- * Officer Christian Cooper from the North Greenbush Police Department

These officers have filled vacancies created by recent retirements, allowing us to maintain our current staffing level of 43 sworn officers.

Additionally, Sergeant Matthew Egnor was promoted to Lieutenant and Officer Matthew McCaffrey to Sergeant.

The four new officers and Sergeant McCaffrey have been assigned to the Patrol Division, our largest unit with 25 officers and 5 sergeants. Our Patrol Division is responsible for responding to calls for service, traffic enforcement, crime prevention, and misdemeanor criminal investigations.

Traffic Safety

The Guilderland Police Department is committed to ensuring the safety of our roads. This is achieved through a combination of traffic law enforcement, deterrence measures, and public education efforts. In 2024, our officers conducted 4,945 vehicle stops, resulting in 2,253 traffic citations and 53 DWI arrests. These figures highlight our officers' dedication to upholding traffic safety. It's important to note that officers issue far more warnings than citations. Traffic safety remains a top priority for our department, and we will continue to work diligently to keep our roads

safe for everyone.

programs: Buckle Up New York, Operation Safe Stop Education and Enforcement Day, No Empty Chair, and STEP (Selective Traffic Enforcement Program). STEP focuses on aggressive enforcement of violations such as aggressive driving, speeding, and driver distraction, including cell phone use.

We continue to partner with the Guilderland Central School District for Operation Safe Stop. We utilize portable traffic speed signs to assist in monitoring vehicle speeds and identify areas needing increased patrols. These portable signs are moved throughout the town as needed. The town also has four permanent traffic signs that have been placed in different areas of the town.

The Guilderland Police Department Traffic Safety Unit also conducts accident investigations and reconstructions. These officers have specialized training in accident reconstruction and utilize a Trimble workstation and scanner. The Trimble provides precise measurements, resulting in exact accident reconstructions. This tool is used in cases

involving serious personal injury or fatal motor vehicle accidents. The equipment was purchased new this year through grant funding.

In 2024, there was one fatal motor vehicle accident in the town.
Additionally, officers responded to 1,002 property damage accidents, 89 personal injury accidents, and 44 unknown motor vehicle accidents.

Community Service Unit

The Guilderland Police Department's Community Services Unit (CSU) is dedicated to strengthening ties within our community and beyond. The CSU includes a Youth Services Officer, two School Resource Officers (SROs), and an Investigator. It is further supported by the Patrol Division, which provides D.A.R.E. Officers, R.A.D. Instructors, and bicycle patrol officers.

Our CSU members are certified juvenile officers who focus on engaging with the youth in our community. The Unit collaborates with local schools to offer educational programs for students, covering topics such as Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.), bullying prevention, forensics, public policy, and internet safety.

Outside of the school environment, our unit actively engages with the community through several programs, including:

- * Guilderland Police Cadets
- * Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) Program
- * Drug Take Back Day
- * Coffee with a Cop
- * Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events Training (CRASE)
- * Fraud Prevention for seniors
- * Child Passenger Safety Seat Installations
- * Halloween Safety Awareness

Our largest event is National Night Out, which takes place at Tawasentha Park. This national communitybuilding campaign aims to foster stronger relationships between the police and the

community.





K-9

Officer Stevens joined the department in 2006 and became our newest canine handler in 2021 with the addition of K9 Boreas, who is now approximately four years old. Officer Stevens and K9 Boreas

were fully certified by DCJS in December 2021 for Explosive Detection, Tracking, Article Searches, and Handler Protection/Criminal Apprehension.

To maintain proficiency, the Guilderland Police Canine Team regularly trains with the Capital District Canine Training Group.
Officer Stevens and K9 Boreas have also completed several outside training seminars and numerous training events with the Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services, the FBI, and the New York State Police.

In 2024, Officer Stevens and K9 Boreas were frequently called upon to assist surrounding agencies with search warrants, suspicious packages, bomb threats, and large-scale community events. They also supported the Guilderland Police Department on calls for service such as shots fired, tracking for suspects and missing persons, crimes in progress, area searches, and other investigations, as well as participating in Guilderland Police community events.

Officer Stevens and K9 Boreas have visited several schools in the GCSD to speak with students and have attended multiple D.A.R.E. graduations. The Canine team enjoys engaging with the community and can be seen at local events such as the Altamont Fair, National Night Out, and Coffee with a Cop.

Retail Interdiction Detail

Police Officers Barak E. Strock and David E. Grant serve as Retail Interdiction Detail (RID) Investigators for the Guilderland Police Department. In 2024, Police Officer Nicholas Crodelle temporarily assumed the role of RID Investigator while another investigator recovered from an injury sustained during a foot pursuit with a combative suspect. RID Investigators are selected for this specialized unit by the Chief of Police based on their ability to interact with the public, investigate and solve larcenies, and deter crime at Crossgates Mall.

RID Investigators handled 1,582 documented calls for service. 157 adult arrests made at Crossgates Mall, 123 of those arrests were made by the RID Investigators. 34 arrests that involved juveniles

Crossgates Mall, located in the Town of Guilderland, is the fifth-largest shopping mall in New York State. The Guilderland Police Department operates a substation within the mall to address complaints and arrests, particularly in the eastern part of the town. In 2018, Chief McNally established the Retail Interdiction Detail (RID), a specialized unit consisting of two uniformed RID Investigators dedicated exclusively to preventing retail theft, apprehending shoplifters, and enhancing safety for both shoppers and employees at Crossgates Mall. RID Investigators focus on theft-related incidents, as well as disruptive or criminal

behavior within the mall. They collaborate closely with Crossgates Mall Security & Management, and loss prevention personnel from various stores to ensure a coordinated and effective approach to crime prevention. RID Investigators leverage an extensive network of security cameras and advanced license plate readers to gather leads and share imagery with the Capital Region Crime Analysis Center for suspect identification. The intelligence gathering techniques employed by RID Investigators often leads to the issuance of arrest warrants for suspects who are not apprehended for a crime at the time of its occurrence. This targeted approach, focused on disrupting repeat offenders, enables the Guilderland Police Department and surrounding agencies to combat and dismantle organized retail theft rings more effectively.

For his extensive and tireless efforts in deterring larcenies and apprehension of shoplifters, two Crossgates Mall stores offered special recognition to RID Investigator Barak Strock. He was named the "Officer of the Quarter" by Gap Inc, the parent company of Gap and Old Navy stores, and was presented with the 2024 Certificate of Recognition by Victoria's Secret.

In 2024, RID Investigators handled 1,582 documented calls for service. There was a total of 157 adult arrests made at Crossgates Mall, 123 of those arrests were made by the RID Investigators. Additionally, RID Investigators were responsible for making 34 arrests that involved juveniles.

CROSSGATES

Notable Cases

Some arrests, outside of the routine shoplifting incidents, made by RID Investigators to note:

April 13, 2024: A RID Investigator arrested a 23-year-old male for an internal theft from his employer, Get Air, an entertainment venue in Crossgates Mall. An investigation uncovered that the employee had processed refunds in the amount of \$12,282 that were not requested by customers and kept the money for himself. The suspect was charged with Grand Larceny in the 3rd Degree, a Class 'D' Felony and Falsifying Business Records in the 1st Degree, a Class 'E' Felony.

April 19, 2024: A 58-year-old male fled on foot from a Guilderland Police RID Investigator attempting to interview him as a suspect in the larceny of \$10,750 worth of products from Le Chic, a kiosk in Crossgates Mall. The suspect was located hiding beneath a car in the parking lot. The suspect was charged with Grand Larceny in the 3rd Degree, a Class 'D' Felony.

April 28, 2024: A RID Investigator and other Guilderland Police patrol officers responded to a report of a larceny that had occurred at Dick's Sporting Goods. The 31-year-old male suspect attempted to leave the area in a vehicle, but was stopped near the Best Buy parking lot. \$1,117 worth of stolen merchandise was observed in plain view on the back seat of the vehicle and a subsequent search uncovered a silicone container of crack cocaine. The suspect was charged with Grand Larceny in the 4th Degree, a Class 'E' Felony, amongst other misdemeanor charges. After attempting to provide a false name during the booking process, the suspect was determined to be a wanted person out of Greenville, South Carolina for a firing a handgun at a homeowner during an armed home invasion.

May 7, 2024: A 24-year-old female fled from a Guilderland Police patrol officer and a RID Investigator attempting to conduct a traffic stop at Crossgates Mall. The suspect fled at speeds in excess of 90mph in a 55mph zone while holding onto a child who appeared to be 3-4 years old. Pursuit was terminated and the suspect was later apprehended on May 26, 2024 in relation to this incident. Suspect was charged with Endangering the Welfare of a Child and Unlawful Fleeing a Police Officer in a Motor Vehicle, amongst other misdemeanor charges.

May 8, 2024: RID Investigators responded to a report of a known shoplifter, committing a larceny inside Dick's Sporting Goods. The 34-year-old male, and his 42-year-old male accomplice, were located inside a vehicle in the Best Buy parking lot. Said vehicle contained thousands of dollars of stolen merchandise from various Crossgates Mall stores. Both subjects were charged with Criminal Possession of Stolen Property in the 3rd Degree, a Class 'D' Felony. Both subjects were later identified as suspects involved in a ring of organized retail thefts that occurred in the Town of Colonie.

May 17, 2024: RID Investigators responded to a report of two male occupants fleeing from a vehicle after a motor vehicle crash in the vicinity of Great Oaks Executive Park. During a brief foot pursuit, one suspect, a 16-year-old male, was observed discarding something in a large bush. The item was located and found to be a loaded Glock 43 semi-automatic handgun. The suspect was charged with Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the 2nd Degree, a Class 'C' Felony.

August 20, 2024: A RID Investigator responded to the report of larcenies from the Five Below and Buckle stores. The 34-year-old male suspect was pursued on foot to the parking lot of Forever 21 and apprehended as he attempted to hide inside a stolen vehicle. The suspect was charged with Criminal Possession of Stolen Property in the 3rd Degree, a Class 'D' Felony.

CROSSGATES

September 4, 2024: A RID Investigator observed a vehicle displaying an inspection sticker that was several years expired driving through the Best Buy parking lot. The 28-year-old male driver of the vehicle was found to have a suspended license and several outstanding warrants. During a subsequent search of the driver and the vehicle, a large quantity of crystalized methamphetamine and two types of narcotic analgesic pills were located. The suspect was charged with Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance in the 3rd Degree, a Class 'B' Felony.

CROSSGATES

Criminal Investigation Unit

The Criminal Investigation Unit (CIU) plays a crucial role within the Police Department, managing a diverse caseload, fulfilling assigned tasks, and supporting the Patrol Unit as needed, primarily focusing on felony cases. Supervised by a First Sergeant, the CIU consists of four dedicated investigators, with responsibilities distributed among its members.

The CIU's functions include:

- * Crime scene technicians
- * Evidence and property room management
- * Accident investigation
- * Photo arrays
- * Pistol permits
- * Employee background checks
- * Peddlers permit backgrounds

- * Arresting individuals on outstanding warrants and administratively processing warrants
- * Professional standard investigations
- * Drug investigations
- * Death investigations
- * Criminal investigations

Furthermore, the Guilderland Police Department collaborates with the DEA Task Force, enhancing our ability to combat drug-related crimes through combined manpower and resources.

The CIU maintains strong collaborative relationships with various agencies to ensure successful case outcomes, including:

- * United States Secret Service
- * FBI
- * Homeland Security

- * New York State Police
- * New York State Narcotics Enforcement
- * Probation/Parole

Additionally, the CIU works closely with town fire departments and Guilderland Emergency Medical Services at emergency scenes within the Town of Guilderland.

The Criminal Investigation Unit, with the support of the Albany County District Attorney's Office, is still actively investigating the 1995 unsolved homicide of Wayne Price, who resided on Church Rd in Guilderland.

2024 Notable CIU cases:

In February, the CIU investigated a reported gunpoint robbery at the 1700 Western Ave apartments. The victim arranged to meet a woman he met on an online dating app in the apartment complex parking lot. After talking in the car, they went to McDonald's and then returned to the parking lot to eat in the car. While they were eating, two males approached the vehicle, brandishing handguns. One of them took the victim's Apple Watch, phone, and wallet, while the other appeared to be acting as a lookout. Both males pulled the victim from the driver's seat, entered the vehicle with the woman, and drove off. The suspects stopped at a deli and convenience store in Troy and tried to sell an iPhone to the clerk. The vehicle was soon found near the Hudson Pointe Apartments in Troy. The Troy Police Department had responded to a similar robbery about 30 minutes before the Guilderland incident. The same suspects were determined to be involved in both robberies. The female suspect was determined to have played an active role in the robbery, and all three suspects were arrested. All suspects pleaded guilty to the robbery and received state prison sentences. One male received a 10-year sentence, while the other male and the female received 5-year sentences. All defendants will have five years of postrelease supervision upon completing their sentences.

In September, the Guilderland Police received a report of a deceased person behind an abandoned house on Western Avenue. The victim had been deceased for an extended

period of time. Members of CIU responded and collected evidence and documented the scene. The Albany County Coroner's Office transported the victim to Ellis Hospital. An autopsy revealed no signs of trauma or foul play and that the victim had likely died 4-5 months prior to the discovery. An investigation by members of the CIU determined the victim was homeless and a possible identity was obtained. Further investigation revealed a possible relative who provided a DNA sample for comparison to the victims. The DNA was submitted to the New York State Police Forensic Investigation Center who was able to confirm the identity of the victim.

Also in September, the Guilderland Police Department received complaints from customers of Juniors Bar and Grill in Hamilton Square regarding fraudulent charges on their credit cards after they dined at the establishment and paid via credit card. After reviewing surveillance video, investigators identified a suspect who, upon further investigation, was found to have a history of identity theft. Her cell phone was secured as evidence, and a search warrant was obtained from a Guilderland Town Justice. The execution of the warrant led to the discovery of additional victims. The suspect was interviewed and connected to similar cases in the area from other police agencies. The suspect has been arrested, and the case has been forwarded to the Albany County District Attorney's Office for prosecution.

Financial scams are becoming more diverse, with fraudsters using methods such as lottery wins, fake family emergencies, fraudulent checks, and claims of compromised computers to deceive victims. A common tactic is to ask victims to buy gift cards or Bitcoin as payment. Reputable companies will never request payment in these ways, nor will they ask for cash via mail, in-person pick-ups, or wire transfers. If you suspect a scam, contact your local police department for guidance, research the company for complaints, and report the incident to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center at www.IC3.gov. Always be cautious before sending any money.

The CIU would like to remind everyone that identity theft remains a significant issue for police departments nationwide. The best way to prevent identity theft is to protect all your personal information and proactively monitor your credit report for any unauthorized activity. Please take precautions to protect your personal information.

Here are some tips to help you safeguard your data:

- * Avoid opening emails from unfamiliar senders or companies.
- * Use only reputable websites.
- * When shopping online, ensure that your purchases are made through secure websites. If you're unsure, contact the company directly.

If you believe you have been a victim of identity theft:

- * Run a credit report and flag your credit to protect against future unauthorized activity.
- * File reports directly with the institutions where your identity was used without your authorization. Note that most financial institutions will require you to also file a report with your local police department.
- * The police will review your case, request supporting documentation, and attempt to identify a suspect. Please be aware that suspect identification can be difficult, especially when purchases are made over the Internet and in different states or countries.
- * Report the theft to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) online at www.ftc.gov by following the prompts.

Fire Investigation



The Town of Guilderland Fire Investigation team was formed in 1977 and as of 2024 is composed of two police officers, one volunteer firefighter, the Town of Guilderland Fire Prevention Bureau and Code Enforcement. The team is led by


Police Chief Daniel McNally.


In 2024, the Town of Guilderland Fire Investigation Team responded to 15 fires. A total of 231 hours were devoted to investigating these fires.

Investigating a fire is an arduous task. There are many factors that come in to play when investigating a fire scene that can help to determine the cause classification of a fire. Fires are classified by four categories; Accidental, Natural, Incendiary and Undetermined.

In 2024, the Town of Guilderland Fire Investigation Team investigated a total of 15 fires. Four of those fires were considered 'Incendiary' meaning a fire that is intentionally ignited in an area or under circumstances where and when there should not be a fire. Incendiary fires and 'Arson' are often confused. While both of these are intentional in nature, they are two different types of events. 'Incendiary' fires are ones that are set intentionally, regardless of context or motive. 'Arson', on the other hand, is defined as an intentional act of setting fire or causing an explosion whether it was done maliciously, intentionally or recklessly. The individual motive would be to cause damage to property. In simple terms, all arson is a form of incendiary fire, but not all incendiary fires are considered arson.

In the New York State Penal Law there are specific legal consequences of arson that range from misdemeanor to felony level. Consequences for such could be fines and imprisonment in some cases. One subject was arrested in 2024 for setting fire to a residential structure, which destroyed the entire building, leaving several people homeless.





Animal control



The Town of Guilderland Animal Shelter is located at 6363 Frenches Mill Road, Guilderland Center NY. Our Animal Control staff operates from this location, handling various responsibilities, including ensuring the best possible

care for the animals and reuniting lost dogs with their owners.


Our Animal Control Officers are dedicated to public safety, enforcing relevant sections of the Town Law, and adhering to NYS Agriculture and Markets Law Article 7. They also

manage a range of issues, such as collecting stray dogs, addressing basic wildlife concerns like raccoons in garages or sick animals, and handling occasional bat encounters in homes.

Please note that Town Animal Control Officers are not licensed to trap or remove wildlife.

To ensure the safety and well-being of our community, please keep your animals safe, ensure their rabies vaccinations are current, and license them with the town as required by law.




Retirements
